Academic calendar is prepared every year based on the action plans of various departments and that of the University. Teaching plans are prepared for the purpose. As an institution of higher learning affiliated to Mahatma Gandhi University, Kottayam we do follow the curricula and syllabi prescribed by the University for all the 12 UG Programmes, 9 PG Programmes and 2 Research Programmes being offered. In all these programmes, we follow CBCS, elective course system and in addition to this, we enhance the employability of our students through the introduction of enrichment programmes like Value Added Courses, Diploma courses, Certificate courses, Add-on Programmes and Open Courses. As an initiative to ensure academic flexibility, we have introduced 8 Value added courses, 2 Diploma courses, 12 Add-on courses, 2 Certificate courses and 12 Open courses during the last three years. In 2019-20 academic year the whole under graduate students of our college has enrolled for at least one of these courses.

Mentoring process in the college is carried out by establishing a stable long standing relationship in between a teacher and a student. The student joining the college is assigned a mentor and this starts the beginning of a sort of partnership between someone with vast experience and someone who wants to learn. The mentor takes time to share experiences, guide the mentees in personal and professional uncertainties and acts as a person the mentee can confide in. A mentoring workshop was carried out under the leadership of IQAC during the academic year 2019-20, in which the teachers were given guidance to continue their mentoring with renewed enthusiasm. The departments maintain the mentor mentee list . A mentoring diary is also maintained by the mentors. The mentoring process has immensely helped in strengthening the teacher student relationship and given confidence to the students to turn to their teachers in times of uncertainties in their academic and personal life. Mentors are given support to carry out the process effectively by ensuring availability of a professional counsellor in the campus once in a week so that students in need may be given help.

The physical facilities of the campus are maintained on regular basis under the guidance of the college bursar. The service of various technical personnel is sought for maintenance of electrical, plumbing and IT infrastructure. Classrooms with furniture, teaching aids and laboratories are maintained by the respective department staff and attendants and supervised by the respective Head of the Department. The laboratory assistants take care of their respective laboratories. The Heads of Departments report to the administration periodically for all the maintenance works. Minor repairs are registered in a

ledger maintained in the office and are attended on priority basis. Staff of respective department monitor effective utilisation of the laboratories. The college ensures optimal allocation and utilization of the available financial resources for maintenance and upkeep of different facilities by holding regular meetings of various committees constituted for this purpose and using the grants received, the college as per the requirements in the interest of students. Stock register and breakage register of lab equipments and consumables respectively are maintained in the concerned departments supervised by HODs.

Other measures to maintain laboratories are as follows: The calibration, repairing and maintenance of sophisticated lab equipments are done by the technicians of related owner enterprises. The microscopes used for biological and geological experiments are annually cleaned and maintained by the concerned departments and record of maintenance is maintained by lab technicians and supervised by HODs of the concerned departments. Annual maintenance and calibration of Oscilloscopes are also done. There is systematic disposal of waste of all types such as biodegradable chemical/chemical and e-waste. The IT infrastructure facilities in the campus is maintained and upgraded systematically under the supervision of the Bursar. Usage registers are maintained in common computer labs and also for other major equipment used. The requirement and list of books is taken from the concerned departments and HoDs are involved in the process. The finalized list of required books is purchased duly approved by the Principal. The maintenance of sports facilities are done under the supervision of Physical Education Department. The department coordinates the activities like procurement and maintenance of sports infrastructure.

Faculty has opportunity to coordinate activities of the clubs in the college to groom leadership skills. Training was given to elected students union council members for enhancing their decision making skills. The institution has also taken initiatives for improving soft skills of students and thereby improving their chances for getting job placements. Faculty is encouraged to take part in the various enrichment programmes conducted by the university, government and other HEIs. The institution is promoting informal gatherings of administrative staff to celebrate special occasions like birthdays, festivals etc. Outing programs of academic and non-academic staffs are encouraged by the institution. The students and the staff who made achievements are congratulated immediately through the public addressing system and Whatsapp group of the college. The college facilitate personal loan from Teachers Co-operative society and banks through issuing salary certificates.</p>
Admission of Students	<p>Students are admitted on merit basis through centralized allotment process (CAP) by the university. Management , community, sports and cultural quota and differently abled students are admitted by the college according to the govt. and university norms giving due weightage to quality and merit. Research and Development	Motivated faculty is encouraged to



carry out research in their area of expertise. 32 of the faculty has Ph.D and institute have 2 research centres. During the period of 2019-20 four PhD was produced by the faculty members. There are 74 research scholars in Deva Matha College and 11 research guides. 19 international publications and 24 books have been produced by the faculty members during the period. Management encourage faculty to take up FDP, Major/Minor projects etc. IQAC boost faculty members to apply for research promotion schemes such as summer research projects (Indian Academy of Sciences) and FLAIR (Govt.of Kerala) etc. Deva Matha College publishes an interdisciplinary journal 'Research Lines' twice in an year. Faculty publishes articles in international/national journals, books, book chapters etc. The institution has organized a seminar on Intellectual Property Rights to make researchers aware about the importance of intellectual property rights. Post graduate students are also motivated by the teachers to prepare articles and participate in various research oriented workshops. P.G. Students also enroll in INFLIBNET to improve their quality reading of literatures and research aspiration. Three of our students have qualified National Eligibility Test for Junior Research Fellowship during the academic year.

Teaching and Learning

Teaching and learning activities pertaining to an academic year is included in the college calendar in accordance with the university academic calendar after the approval from the college council. Teachers rely on modern technologies such as audio visual aids, to impart maximum knowledge to the students. The institution has facilitated training to faculty members to enhance their teaching learning capabilities to cope up with Covid-19 situation. Teachers have also developed courses for MOOC (Massive Open Online Courses). Online teaching has been facilitated to P.G.Students and U.G students through MOODLE and Google classrooms, respectively. Teaching learning activities are student centric and are planned accordingly. Apart from regular classroom teaching slow learners are



identified for remedial coaching and advanced learners for WWS programme. Mentoring and counseling sessions are given to the needy students. Group activates, on the job training, industrial visits and workshops are conducted to help students in their learning process. In order to inform students about concurrent changes in the field of their discipline various academic seminars are organized by the departments. To enhance the employability of passing out students finishing school programmes are conducted by the departments.

1. Saplings are planted and trees preserved, to keep the campus green. The NSS unit of college planted 150 saplings of varied trees in the campus to observe the 150 th anniversary of Gandhiji's birth on the occasion of Van Mahotsav celebrations. 2. Biodegradable and non-biodegradable wastes disposed separately. 3. The college also maintains a poly house to familiarize students with the methodology of organic farming. The organic crop so produced is sold at market rate to the staff members. 4. To popularise the use of biodegradable bags and flies the department of Chemistry conducts an add on course titled Chemistry in the Service of Man. 5. The NSS unit conducted a Plastic collection drive in the campus on 3rd August,2019. 6. The NSS unit conducted a drive to collect e-waste in the campus from departments and laboratories. The collected waste amounting to 200 kg was handed over to a vendor dealing with electronic waste in the district. 7. An indigenous food festival was conducted by NSS unit Theenmela 2020 - Green Protocol Food festival as part of Youth Day celebrations. The fund raised from the programme was used for anti-narcotic awareness programme in the campus by following Green protocol in all stages of the programme. Plastic products were replaced by using steel plates and glasses, banana leaves etc. 8.The NSS unit observed the World Environment Day by planting medicinal trees in the campus. 9.The college have made a total withdrawal from the use of flex and other plastic substances. Instead we are now using cloth based materials. 10. Implementation of paperless communications(Notice, circular, feedback etc.)using G-suite. 11.In order to minimize the use of chemicals and effluents to the environment the department of chemistry introduced the microanalysis .

## 7.2 – Best Practices

### 7.2.1 – Describe at least two institutional best practices

1. Haritha Graham: A Green Initiative of the Campus The Green Protocol has become a part and parcel of the campus. Several programmes were held on the campus as zero waste initiatives. Plastic carry bags, disposable cups and plates, tissue papers are banned in the campus. Online submission of assignments substituted the use of papers. An indigenous food festival was conducted by the NSS unit -Theenmela 2020 - Green Protocol Food festival - as part of Youth Day celebrations. The fund raised from the programme was used for anti-narcotic awareness programmes in the campus by following Green protocol in all stages of the programme. Plastic products were replaced by using steel plates and glasses, banana leaves etc. The agenda of the food fest highlighted the implanting of healthy food habits among youth. Conscious efforts were taken to use only environment friendly products in the campus. Cloth banners replaced the Flex banners for all the programmes of the college to popularise the use of biodegradable products. The Department of Chemistry conducted an add on course titled "Chemistry in the Service of Man". The students learn to develop biodegradable bags and files from this course. In order to minimize the use of chemicals and effluents to the environment the department of chemistry introduced the microanalysis . The NSS unit observed the World Environment Day by planting medicinal trees in the campus. It started planting saplings of various trees in the campus on the occasion of Van Mahotsav celebrations to observe the 150th anniversary of Gandhiji's birth. The NSS unit also conducted a drive to collect e-waste in the campus from departments and laboratories. The collected waste amounting to 200 kg was handed over to a vendor dealing with electronic waste in the district. The Unit also conducted a Plastic collection drive in the campus on 4th August 2019. The institution is conscious of the need to stand along the global demand of energy conservation. As a step to sustain and safeguard the electrical energy, the college has installed a solar power unit (3000 watts) which gives a fraction of the annual power requirement. College has constructed rain water harvesting tank (400000 liters) underneath the new self-financing block. The NSS unit of the college in association with the local self-government of Kuravilangad brought laurels by adopting a village. The campaign for E- Waste collection was a key activity of the three-day camp. The date and schedule of e-waste collection was published in newspapers well ahead of time. The Rotary Club chapter of Kuravilangad financially aided the collection drive. The drive, first of its kind in the Panchayath, received oodles of support and welcome from every households. The students completed the massive task by collecting a whopping 340 Kgs of electronic waste. The collected waste was handed over the next day to authorized e- waste management partners in Kottayam for further disposal. In collaboration with the NSS unit of St. Marys College Manarcadu, DMC NSS unit arranged a one-day workshop on turning waste materials into useful eco-friendly products. A group of 10, including the programme officers and NSS volunteers of St. Mary's College gave hands on training on the making of eco- friendly paper pens from old magazines, mats from waste cloths, cloth bags from old rags, decorative and fancy items from old bottles etc. Moonunoyambu is the most significant feast of St. Mary's Forane Church Kuravilangad which brings several thousands of people in each day of the feast. In association with the Green Mission office of Kottayam district and Grama Panchayathu of Kuravilangad, the NSS unit of DMC participated in the maintenance of green protocol zone at Pallikkavala in Kuravilangad. The NSS volunteers disseminated the message of ban on plastic usage in the zone and helped people to deal with plastic waste. As part of the cleaning programme in Swatchata Week, the NSS unit undertook a cleaning drive at the Government Hospital Kuravilangad. On October 2, a group of 30 NSS volunteers took up the cleaning mission at the Kuruppanthara Railway Station in Kottayam district. As part of the cleanliness mission undertaken

under Valicheriyal Muktha Campus, Gramam, Nagaram, the NSS volunteers cleaned all the classrooms of the college on October 3. The NSS unit also collaborated with the Local self-government of Kuravilangad in the river cleaning initiative named Ini Njan Ozhukatte. As part of the project, the volunteers helped cleaning the heavily littered 'valiya thodu'- main rivulet- which was the sole source of paddy fields in the area for agriculture erstwhile. Plastic waste was collected from the rivulet first and the bushes in the riverside were pruned properly. The Seven Day Special camp for the NSS volunteers was conducted at Govt. Higher Secondary School Kadappoor, which aimed at improving the cleanliness literacy of the volunteer's as well as the people in the adopted villages through various programmes. The volunteers spread the message of cleanliness by distributing self-made paper carry bags to the houses in ward number 4 of Kanakkari Grama Panchayathu. They also cleaned the School and its premises and conducted a cleaning drive at the Primary Health Centre Koodalloor during the camp. The NCC cadets also took part in the cleaning programme as part of Swachh bharaat pakhwada, in the government Taluk hospital Kuravilangad on 28 th September 2019. To deliberately avoid the use of plastic, an awareness cycle Rally was held by the joint venture of the college NCC unit and Pala St. Thomas college naval unit. On 30 December 2019, NCC cadets of the college conducted a plastic waste collection programme, in which ten sacks of plastic were collected by the cadets.

2. Science in Everyday Life The development of a Scientific attitude enables us to think rationally. National Science Day Celebration-SPARKZ 2020 was celebrated by the Department of Physics on 26th February 2020. As part of Science day celebration, quiz and Inter collegiate seminar competitions were conducted. The event turned out successful because of the support rendered by State Bank of India and Indian Association of Physics Teachers. As part of the venture to provide scientific awareness to the students, various department wise and intercollegiate programmes were organized by the college. The Department of Physics conducted APJ Abdul Kalam quiz for the degree students on 6th August 2019. A coin collection exhibition named NUMISMATICS was conducted by the PG Department of Physics on 27th September 2019 the main objective of the programme was to inculcate an interest in students to analyse the economic history of a society, because they can be used to trace the ebb and flow of coinage, a change in the weight system and the introduction of different metals into circulation. The Department of Zoology organized an Intra college exhibition on 29th December 2019. The specimens and equipments were displayed in the museum and the lab. The student volunteers explained about the specimens answered the queries raised by the visitors. The department also hosted an inter-collegiate fest -VENTURA- on 7th February, 2020. Various online and offline competitions were conducted as part of the fest. The Department of Botany came out in flying colours when it took the initiative to conduct an inter collegiate botany quiz on 19th February 2020 to inculcate love towards nature and develop scientific values among the students.

The quiz was a great success because of the participation of 12 prestigious institutions from different districts of Kerala. The Department of Mathematics organized a Seminar titled 'Math Career' on December 18, 2019. The participants got an awareness on the different opportunities available after getting graduation degree in Mathematics. ### 7.3 – Institutional Distinctiveness

7.3.1 – Provide the details of the performance of the institution in one area distinctive to its vision, priority and thrust in not more than 500 words

Promote social responsibility and integrity. It is the vision of the college to serve the nation by facilitating socially relevant education to realize the values of humanism. In providing such education, the college believe that economic status, gender or religious beliefs should not be a hindrance for students. In order to achieve the goal, various programmes have been organised in the institution. To be socially committed, blood donation camps were conducted and many students donated their blood. The conduct of various camps under the auspices of NCC and NSS unit of the college gives the students practical knowledge towards building social responsibility. Many students took part in the road safety and traffic awareness programmes. The students actively participated in the construction of house to the needy. The students inculcated the value of sharing and having empathy towards the fellow being. During the flood, the college acted as the relief collection centre. Food packets and dresses were distributed in the flood camps by the students, teachers and the administrative staff. Programmes like training classes, awareness Rally, e-waste collection drive, Plastic collection drive, and activities like Cleaning hospitals, railway stations, waterbodies etc have been conducted to make students to have the quality of social commitment. The NSS unit of the college in association with the local self-government of Kuravilangad brought laurels by adopting a village. The campaign for E- Waste collection was a key activity of the three-day camp. The students completed the massive task by collecting a whopping 340 Kgs of electronic waste. The collected waste was handed over the next day to authorized e- waste management partners in Kottayam for further disposal. The celebration of days of National importance and celebrating the birthdays of important personalities the students are given models of responsible personalities. The students enthusiastically participate in the various activities conducted by the different associations. To develop community orientation among the students, programmes like Love Your Neighbour Programme, visit to Nava Jeevan Trust etc have been conducted. As a part of the project kunje ninakkai for the acknowledgement of POCSO law of child protection a RALLEY and an awareness video campaign was held by the joint endeavour of NCC unit and Kuravilangad police. The cadets NCC unit participated in the palliative care program conducted in association with Anugraha Charitable Trust. For the prevention of covid-19 the NCC unit of Devamatha college Kuravilangad along with Anugraha Charitable Trust has distributed masks to all the houses in Kuravilangad grama panchayat for free and thereby made the panchayat, the first fully mask distributed panchayat in India. Around 19000



mask were distributed to around 5000 houses in Kuravilangad panchayat. Cadets of Devamatha college Kuravilangad NCC unit and Anugraha Charitable Trust made arrangements for cutting and scheduling cover materials for making 50000 masks. Moving on to the third phase of mask distribution, NCC Sub Unit of Devamatha College, Kuravilangad along with Anugraha Charitable Trust has sent 3000 masks to Covid 19 hotspots in Karnataka, Maharashtra and Gujarat.

## 8.Future Plans of Actions for Next Academic Year

In addition to the phased implementation of the quality improvement suggested by NAAC peer team in 2017 visit, the following events are planned for next year in the order of priority : 1) Conduct of Academic and Administrative Audit (AAA) for the last 3 years (2017-20): An external AAA is on the top of the plans of IQAC for next year. 2) Conduct of a Workshop on OBE: IQACs proposal for the conduct of workshop on Outcome Based Education got approval from NAAC. It is expected to be conducted in the next academic year. 3) Implementation of a Campus Automation Software (ERP): This ERP will automate all the processes related to students' admissions, fee payment, attendance, continuous evaluation, progression etc. The proposals for the same has been evaluated by IQAC, software vendor shortlisted. The selected 6 modules of the ERP will be implemented next academic year onwards. Library is partially automated. Full automation is expected to complete in coming years. 4) Renovation of Administrative wing: The renovation of administrative wing shall be completed next year. This will help in creating an ergonomic work environment for the administrative staff as well as give a pleasant atmosphere to the visitors. 5) Preparation Evaluation of Action plans for each department and Clubs/association based on RAF of NAAC: Departments have been preparing their action plans and execute the curricular and extra-curricular activities accordingly. This will be emphasized more with action taken reports. 6) Conduct of an IPR Seminar for faculty members and public to create awareness about intellectual property rights and encourage inventors to apply for patents. The IQAC has initiated the plan of conducting IPR seminars every year from last year onwards. The next in the series will be conducted in the coming academic year in association with Department of Physics. 7) MOOCs Course on Human Rights: The IQAC initiated training to faculty on e-content development last year. A MOOC course on Human Rights have been developed as a result of this. This MOOC Course will be offered to the fifth Semester UG students, as a supplementary material to their mandatory course on Human Rights. 8) E-Learning facilities - The institution has well equipped computer labs and ICT enabled classrooms, E-learning centre, Multi-media room and smart classrooms. In order to meet the increased demand to meet the challenges in teaching-learning in Covid pandemic, it is planned to enhance the number of smart classrooms, internet bandwidth, Wi-Fi connectivity, audio-video recording devices etc. The plan for the same is given to Management and other funding agencies like RUSA. 9) Infrastructure Improvement: Construction of a separate academic block for self-financing programmes has been completed. The ground work for the new Digital Library block under RUSA scheme has started. This is expected to be completed in the coming academic year. 10) Webinar Series: The IQAC is planning to conduct national as well as international seminars or workshops on various themes/areas/issues identified, in association with various departments, clubs and association through online mode
